The 4-day festival MATTER OF FLUX presented a rich and varied program from and for women/ FLINTA* in art, science and technology with panel discussions, lecture performances, numerous workshops, reading groups and other activities, including artist studio and lab visits. The festival has been generously supported by Kunstfonds' program Neustart Kultur and is in cooperation with FEMeeting. The multifaceted formats and events of the festival program are based on the rich outcome of several preparatory meetings at Art Laboratory Berlin earlier in 2023. More than 40 international Berlin-based women/ FLINTA* – artists, scholars from sciences and humanities and cultural producers in art, science and technology from both the Global North and the Global South – have been invited to collectively develop various CLUSTER groups and activities for the festival. The festival, acting as an interactive platform, welcomed other international or Berlin-based women/ FLINTA* in the fields of art, science and technology to join, exchange and create synergies.

Zero Waste - Art and Knowledge

Discourse series at Urania Berlin, 2022

The series Zero Waste - Art and Knowledge shows the different facets of ecological sustainability and urban coexistence of plants, animals and people. Whether in architecture, fashion, culinary arts, mobility, gardens or cultural practice: what are the challenges of a future-oriented city? What can artistic perspectives illustrate, what can they make tangible and understandable that pure data and facts cannot convey to us? The invited experts will present their work in a dialogue. In each event, an artistic work will be presented and discussed with the audience. Zero Waste - Art and Knowledge combines experiences from science, art and the sustainability movement to create a space for innovative discussions independent of disciplines and to take action together.

Green Energy: Consumption, Justice & Access September 29, 2022, 7.30pm

After a short screening of a video documentation, we spoke about the performative installation "Charging Tesla Crash, A Speculation", a collaboration by **Jean Katambayi, Sammy Baloji, Daddy Tshikaya, and Marjolijn Dijkman**. The work returns to Nikola Tesla's utopian ideas about making wireless energy accessible to everyone around the globe. In the discussion, we reflected on the sustainability aspects of energy transition paths and on today's global inequalities. **Grace Mbungu**, Head of Climate Change Program at the Africa Policy Research Institute (APRI) in Berlin, spoke about the politics and governance of the global energy transition, opportunities for renewable energy development, and gender justice. Together with **Natalia Realpe Carrillo**, a specialist in green inclusive finance and Fellow (Alumni) at IASS, we discussed the role of digitisation to ensure energy justice and access to energy in rural areas.

Sustainable Building & Circular Economy in Architecture

Zero Waste – Art and Knowledge October 26, 2022, 7.30pm

We talked about visions of building with fungi with biotechnologist and fungal researcher, professor of microbiology at the TU Berlin and artist **Prof. Dr. Vera Meyer**. Using objects she has brought with her, the biotechnologist, microbiologist and artist demonstrated the fascinating properties of the local tinder fungus and explains how art offers the opportunity to test out new solutions. Currently, the walk-in wooden mushroom sculpture "My-Co Space", which she co-developed, can be experienced in the central library of the TU Berlin. In addition to her traditional work as an architect at Sauerbruch Hutton Berlin, **Julia Blasius** also works there as a quality manager in the area of sustainability and will talk about the aesthetics and opportunities of reuse in architecture. **Samira Jama Aden** is an architect, consultant and design researcher at the Helmholtz Centre Berlin in the field of photovoltaics as well as a lecturer at the University of Kassel. At the interface of architecture, design and new technologies, she is researching individual solutions for integrating solar cells into new and existing architecture in the Design Research department.

The Earth bears traces of humans everywhere: melting glaciers, dwindling biodiversity. They not only shape landscapes, but also create artificial worlds and intelligences. But with all their knowledge, humans can neither fully comprehend nature and its complex regulatory mechanisms, nor control or predict the future. Together with guest artists, the Berlin-based artist group *pilote contemporary* explores the ambiguity that characterizes the relationship between humans and their environment. On the one hand, humans change and destroy the world, appropriate it and intervene in natural processes in the long term; but at the same time, their own finitude and dependence are revealed. The title "Silent Spring" refers to the 1962 book by biologist Rachel Carson, which is considered a key trigger of the 20th century Western environmental movement. The exhibition questions the Western assumption of human and nature as two separate entities, instead focusing on the manifold connections. Presumed hierarchies are questioned, interrelations are highlighted, and humans are positioned as part of larger processes.


Waste is everywhere: in the Great Pacific garbage patch, as fine particular matter in the air, or as microplastics in the food chain. The group exhibition *Zero Waste* showcases international positions in contemporary art that point out the urgency to save resources, consume less, and live more sustainably. In diverse installations, videos, sculptural works, and photographs the artists investigate the global consequences of plastic packaging, tire abrasion, toxic chemicals, and the overproduction of consumer goods. By means of self-imposed climate-friendly rules, the project also questioned the CO2 footprint of this exhibition. Zero Waste" avoided material-intensive installations, transport and travel over long distances for short stays and cooperated with local actors.

Together with the participants, we processed leftover bread from the Backstein bakery into fine dumplings. The Brazilian-Canadian artist duo Chico Togni and Kadija de Paula talked to us about the Zero Waste exhibition. Part of their installation was a mobile kitchen, which the artists built with and for the community garden ANNALINDE in Leipzig. On 18 July, this was activated and inaugurated with timeless Zero Waste recipes using local herbs and precious leftovers. Parallel to the zero waste kitchen, a guided herb tour with wild herb expert Maxi Pöttrich started in the nearby park: The participants got to know fresh herbs and used them to make a herbal dumpling side dish.

Walk the Talks as Podcasts

Zero Waste Accompanying program

Due to hygiene regulations in the context of the Corona pandemic, only 5 people were able to participate in guided formats at the museum. Therefore, we recorded all four "Walk the Talks" and make them available as MdbK [talk] podcast episodes. The creation of these additional digital formats, which were not originally planned, makes it possible to communicate the discussion of the exhibition's themes and content to a larger audience in the long term.

Border, Echo, Ghosts, Influence, Language, Me, Networks, Power, Trade, Values and Waves: these eleven concepts make up the Unfinished Glossary, which forms a thematic grid with various vantage points from which to explore the thirteen chapters of the exhibition. It comprises of statements by more than thirty international artists, academics and practicians, who provide at least two different takes on each of the concepts listed above. This polyphony, amounting as it does to a plurality of descriptions for these terms – which are quite complex but at the same time deeply rooted in our everyday lives - expands on and questions the allegedly objective perspective represented by traditional museums and classic glossaries. The differences in the biographical and geographical backgrounds of the select authors are relevant for their individual perspectives. The Unfinished Glossary is designed as a space for reflection and outreach activities, where visitors get a chance not only to read up on the different descriptions of the key concepts, but to contribute their own statements as well. Furthermore, the terms provide a structure for the exhibition's accompanying programme, which features film screenings, workshops, talks, guided tours and interventions. Of special interest is the exploration of global relations involving collection histories; the reception of art; the production of knowledge, perspectives and categorisations; and, above all, questions concerning the structure and limits of collections and exhibitions.

In Your Face

Are we humans ready to look ourselves in the eye? - This is the question addressed in Ocean. Now!'s exhibition. With the portrait series "#INYOURFACE - 50 beaches, 50 faces", OceanNow! brings the problem of microplastics into the public eye. In doing so, it links the fields of art and politics. In collaboration with the Olympic Centre Kiel Schilksee, Ocean. Now! is showing 56 photo portraits based on the artwork Microplastics II by the renowned artist Swaantje Güntzel. It shows a photo portrait of the artist with a symbolic beauty mask made of microplastic particles and a bleeding nose. With the series In Your Face, Ocean. Now! - in collaboration with portrait photographers Saskia Uppenkamp and Tomaso Baldessarini - replicated this work on well-known faces. Over a period of three months, dedicated volunteers collected the microplastic from beaches around the world. After delays due to the pandemic, the series, which achieved a media reach of 8 million since 2019 and appeared as a discussion piece in a textbook, is now on view for the first time in a physical exhibition.

Visitors are invited to take a 3D self-portrait digitally using an Instagram filter and post it on social media with a call for a progressive ban on microplastics in cosmetics.
